Why there is a need for Koinonia House®

Pete Duncan never had a job and rarely called any place home other than his cellblock.

"It was the only place I had to come back to," he said. "Things that normal people do were strange to me.

More than 500,000 ex-cons like Duncan will re-enter society this year, and most of them returning to their old neighborhoods and old friends who got them into trouble in the first place. In Ohio 20,000 prisoners are released every year.

But a growing number of them have made commitments to Christ while in prison thanks to the Kairos program at Marion Correctional Institution in Marion. More on this wonderful program in the next issue of 'New Beginnings.'

According to the Administration Office of U.S. Courts, at least 40 percent of ex-cons will commit a new crime or violate parole and be sent back to prison.

Tragically, there are only a handful of community-based programs to help these men re-enter society. And that is exactly why Manny Mill founded Koinonia House® ministry a decade ago. Not only does it benefit the Christian ex-prisoners, but the churches and communities who mentor them are radically changed as well.

Koinonia House® national directors Manny Mill and Bruce Renfroe dedicated the Graham home in Greenville to officially mark the beginning of their ministry to Christian men once they leave prison. "No longer is it "our" house, but it is the Lord's house," John said.

To mark the beginning of the Ohio Koinonia House® ministry, more than 65 people packed the Graham's house on Sept. 9 to hear Manny not only dedicate

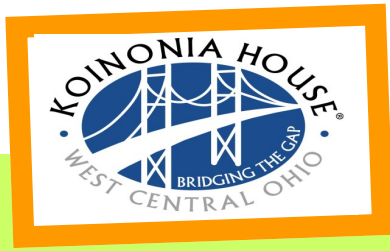

the building, but Bruce Renfroe commission the Grahams as "missionaries," as they call themselves, to the men in the Ohio prison system.

Paraphrasing Numbers 27:18, Bruce commissioned the Grahams with these words: "Take Kathy and John, two people in whom is the spirit, and lay your hand on them. Have them stand before the priest and the entire assembly

and commission them in their presence."

It was a very moving experience for all who attended, and it confirmed what Manny and Bruce have been saying about the Koinonia House ministry. "We fully expect this to break out into a nationwide ministry. This is only the beginning a something very big that God is doing."
